



## Student Achievement Data 2022-2023

Piedmont University evaluates student achievement with respect to outcomes relevant to its mission, which “dedicates itself to the transformation power of education through reciprocal learning”. Specific goals within the strategic plan for the university articulate the institutional commitment to student success.

### **GOAL 2 – Programs**

Piedmont College will ensure educational excellence through curricular and co-curricular programs which enable student success by:

- a) Offering traditional and innovative academic programs that are rigorous in content and flexibility in real-world application;
- b) Educating the whole student through co-curricular programs, extra-curricular activities, and experiential learning; and
- c) Providing students with the resources to achieve their academic goals in a timely fashion and meet learning outcomes in their degree programs.

The university maintains an effective approach to evaluating its success with respect to student achievement, including consideration of satisfactory academic progress, course completion, graduation and retention rates, and state licensing examinations.

## Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP)

The U. S. Department of Education mandates that institutions of higher education establish minimum standards of “satisfactory academic progress” for students receiving financial aid. To be viewed as making satisfactory academic progress a student must (a) have a minimum institutional grade point average (GPA) required for their grade level, (b) successfully complete 67% of all University-level coursework attempted at Piedmont University, and (c) finish his or her educational program before attempting 150% of the number of hours required for the program. The US DOE expected threshold is 90%.

Goal: Students will achieve Satisfactory Academic Progress.

Target = Rate greater than the US DOE threshold of 90%

## Course Completion Rates

Course completion policies require at least a grade of C in specified general education courses. Students must also earn minimum grades of C for all courses in their major, minor, and concentration. Data indicate Piedmont students are successfully completing courses.

Goal: Piedmont students will successfully complete coursework with a grade of A-C.

Target: 85% of students will complete courses with a grade of A-C.

### Graduation Rates for Students Pursuing Bachelor's Degrees – 6 year

Graduation rates measure the percentage of entering students beginning their studies full-time and planning to get a bachelor's degree and who complete their degree program within a specified amount of time as defined by IPEDS as 150% of "normal time".

Goal: To increase the graduation rate annually.

Target: To meet or exceed the 6 year graduation rate for private colleges in Georgia.

### Graduation Rates for Students Pursuing Graduate Degrees

Graduation rates measure the percentage of entering students planning to get a master's degree or a post-master's certificate (Education Specialist), and who complete their degree program within a specified amount of time. Cohorts are defined by students entering within the specified academic year. Normal time for these programs is defined as four semesters.

Goal: To increase the graduation rate annually.

Target: 75%

The charts below represent the percentage of students who received a degree from Piedmont University within 200% of normal time. Each graduate program may have a different normal time based on program requirements.

## Licensure Pass Rates

Specific professional programs use state and/or national exams for entry for licensure after graduation. The pass rate on certification tests and licensure exams are an integral part of the evaluation process in determining student achievement. These tests are as direct measures of successful student learning outcomes.

**Nursing:** The Nursing program continues to be successful in educating BSN candidates as evidenced by passage rates on examinations of the Georgia State Board of Nursing. Pass rates for Piedmont BSN graduates are consistently higher than both the national and Georgia rate.
